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New! Organization: Steelcase Education

**Description**: Steelcase Education helps schools, colleges, and universities create inspiring learning environments through insight-led research and innovation in furniture, tools, and technology.

The Steelcase Education Active Learning Center Grant supports educators in colleges and universities and grade 6-12 classrooms in the United States, U.S. Territories, Puerto Rico, Canada, or Mexico who are ready to use their physical classroom space to advance learning in new and important ways.

The program seeks to create effective, inspiring learning environments to meet the evolving needs of students and educators. The program helps create active learning ecosystems that recognize the independencies between pedagogy, technology, and space, and support and strengthen all three as an integrated whole. Grant recipients choose from a selection of three classroom layouts to meet their specific needs and objectives and to demonstrate what's possible for future space planning.

Eligibility: educators in colleges and universities and grade 6-12 classrooms in the United States, U.S. Territories, Puerto Rico, Canada, or Mexico

Amount of Awards: up to \$132,000.

Description: The Dollar General Literacy Foundation supports nonprofit organizations, educational institutions, and libraries that offer literacy programs in communities served by Dollar General in 44 states. The Foundation provides support through the following grant programs: Adult Literacy Grants support nonprofit organizations that provide direct services to adults in need of literacy assistance. Family Literacy Grants support family literacy service providers that combine parent and youth literacy instruction. Summer Reading Grants help nonprofit organizations, schools, and libraries with the creation or expansion of summer reading programs for students who are below grade level readers or readers with learning disabilities.

Eligibility: nonprofit organizations, schools, and libraries that work to help students who are below grade level or experiencing difficulty reading.

Amount of Awards: up to \$10,000.

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Organization: Fund for Teachers

Description: Fund for Teachers believes that extraordinary leaders are made more extraordinary when they are empowered to push past the boundaries of knowledge. Teachers throughout the U.S. are invited to join a community of educators who are transforming what learning looks like, charting a new course for their students, and revolutionizing their teaching by applying for a life- and career-changing Fund for Teachers fellowship. Teachers must have a minimum of three years of experience and be full-time teachers spending at least 50% of their time in the classroom.

Eligibility: pre-K-12 classroom teachers to immerse themselves in their fields of study

Amount of Awards: up to \$10,000.

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**Organization:** Teaching Tolerance

**Description:** The mission of Teaching Tolerance, a project of the Southern Poverty Law Center, is to help teachers and schools educate children and youth to be active participants in a diverse democracy. Teaching Tolerance Educator Grants support educators who embrace and embed anti-bias principles throughout their schools. These grants support projects that promote affirming school climates and educate youth to thrive in a diverse democracy.

**Eligibility:** These grants fund projects on three levels: school, classroom, and district. Educators nationwide in public or private K-12 spaces, as well as in alternative schools, therapeutic schools, and juvenile justice facilities are eligible to apply

Amount of Awards: \$500 - \$10,000

**Deadline:** Any time

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**Organization:** Florida Agriculture in the Classroom

**Description:** The grants are meant to supplement FAITC's *Gardening for Grades, Gardening for Nutrition* and *STEMming Up Gardening*, three books that take Florida teachers through the process of developing a school garden, and includes lessons to help teachers use the garden to teach health, science, language arts, math, technology, engineering and other subjects.

The grants will be awarded on a first-come, first-serve basis to those who meet all of the grant requirements. The guidelines for the grant are below. Please note multiple teachers from the same school cannot apply for the grant, only one grant recipient per school.

**Eligibility:** Certified teachers in Florida engaged in classroom instruction at the pre-kindergarten through 12th grade level who wish to create fruit and vegetable school gardens to enhance students' understanding of agriculture.

Amount of Awards: \$500.

Deadline: ongoing until funds depleted

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**Organization:** Toshiba Foundation

**Eligibility:** Pre K-12 educators Toshiba America Foundation grants support public and nonprofit private schools throughout the United States.

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Organization: Saxena Family Foundation

**Eligibility:** Public, Charter, Other (including homeschool, 501 (c)(3) organizations)

Amount of Awards: Most awards range from \$5,000 to \$50,000

Deadline: applications accepted year round
