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NEW! Herb Society of America

Description: Thanks to the generosity of Donald Samull, who made a planned gift to The Herb Society of America, an herb garden grant program for elementary school classes was established more than a decade ago. These grants ensure that learning about herbs can be part of the curriculum, a resource Mr. Samull — an elementary school teacher — regularly used in his own classroom

Eligibility: Elementary classrooms grades K-6 with ten students or more

Amount of the Award: 15 grants of \$300 each

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Ben Carson Reading Project

Description: The Carson Scholars Fund seeks to combat the American education crisis by discovering promise and rewarding excellence in U.S. schools. The Fund's Ben Carson Reading Project offers support for Think Big Reading Rooms. This program provides funding for schools to purchase high-interest books, furniture, and decor to create a literacy-rich environment that fosters a love of reading and learning. While the ideal space is a classroom, a portion of the school's library may also be used.

Eligibility: Public and private schools

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National Youth Leadership Council: Youth as Solutions

Description: Youth as Solutions (YaS), a program of the National Youth Leadership Council (NYLC), seeks to create a generation of citizens who are passionate about making a positive impact in their schools and communities. YaS is a guided youth leadership development program where teams of middle and high school students follow NYLC's guided service-learning process to design a solution that meets a need in their community in one of the following areas: education equity, community health, environmental justice, or civics and democracy. One adult leader and two primary youth leaders receive training and support from NYLC to lead their broader youth team in taking collective action. Throughout the school year, teams receive professional development for the adult mentor, youth leadership skill development, funding to implement the project and service activities, and materials, templates, trainings, and support to level up the team's service-learning experience.

Eligibility: Teams consisting of at least two youth in grades six to 12 and an adult mentor from a public school, school district, government entity, or nonprofit are eligible to apply.

Amount of Award: between \$250-\$1,000

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Blue School Grant

Description: The mission of the Blue School Grant is for students to develop an appreciation for Florida's water, an understanding of water as a limited resource, and a water ethic that they can foster throughout their lifetime. Schools must be within the boundaries of the St. Johns River Water Management District. Projects may be for individual classes, teaching teams, or a grade level.

Eligibility: Educators working with grades K-12 in public and charter schools.

Amount of Award: \$3000

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Organization: Henry Chapin Foundation

Description: The Harry Chapin Foundation makes grants in the areas of education, arts, agriculture, and the environment. Priority is given to arts-in-education programs, agricultural and environmental programs, and community education programs. Previous grants were used to fund schools to help prepare children for servant leadership, higher education, and a successful career; organizations that serve children in underserved communities to read, interpret, and respond to their world; and a volunteer effort of planting, picking, rescuing, and delivering free fresh produce.

Eligibility: nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations and public prekindergarten through grade 12 schools.

Amount of Award: Up to \$10,000

Deadline: Applications are accepted year-round

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Organization: The Verizon Foundation

Description: The Verizon Foundation grants education initiatives that support projects promoting digital skills development for kindergarten through grade 12 students and teachers. Examples include summer or afterschool programs in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM); teacher professional development; and research on technology-infused pedagogy.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations, government agencies, hospitals or medical research organizations, public colleges and universities, and public and private elementary and secondary schools.

Amount of Award: Awards vary

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Organization: Association of American Educators Foundation

Description: Classroom grants from the Association of American Educators (AAE) Foundation can be used for a variety of projects and materials, including but not limited to books, software, calculators, mathematics manipulatives, art supplies, audio-visual equipment, lab materials, and more. Funds must be used within one year of the application deadline.

Eligibility: All full-time educators who have not received a scholarship or grant from AAE in the past two years are eligible to apply.

Amount of Award: \$500

Deadline: Applications are due March 1 and October 1, annually.

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Organization: National Wildlife Federation

Description: The National Wildlife Federation, alongside our new partner, [Garden for Wildlife Inc.](#), have launched an initiative to support our partners (k-12 schools, colleges/universities, churches, etc.) in their efforts to **expand quality native habitats for people, pollinators, and wildlife**. Garden for Wildlife Inc., sells “direct-to-consumer” native plants to 38 states in the eastern and central United States (western states are coming soon!)

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Your campus can now apply for free native plants for your native plant and habitat projects

These plants will come pre-selected, be native to your area, and include at least one species of milkweed, an essential plant for supporting pollinators and monarch butterflies. These plants are slightly smaller than quart size, with at least 3 inches of new growth. They will begin to bloom within a couple of months of planting, depending on the season.

Eligibility: US kindergarten through grade 12 public or charter school teachers.

Deadline: Applications are accepted year-round. Funding decisions are made in June and November, annually.

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Organization: Florida Agriculture in the Classroom

Description: The grants are meant to supplement FAITC's *Gardening for Grades*, *Gardening for Nutrition* and *STEMming Up Gardening*, three books that take Florida teachers through the process of developing a school garden, and includes lessons to help teachers use the garden to teach health, science, language arts, math, technology, engineering and other subjects.

The grants will be awarded on a first-come, first-serve basis to those who meet all of the grant requirements. The guidelines for the grant are below. Please note multiple teachers from the same school cannot apply for the grant, only one grant recipient per school.

Eligibility: Certified teachers in Florida engaged in classroom instruction at the pre-kindergarten through 12th grade level who wish to create fruit and vegetable school gardens to enhance students' understanding of agriculture.

Amount of Awards: \$500.

Deadline: ongoing until funds depleted

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Organization: Toshiba Foundation

Description: Toshiba America Foundation (TAF) grants fund the projects ideas and materials teachers need to innovate in their math and science classrooms. TAF is interested in funding projects designed by teachers or small teams of teachers for use in their own schools.

Toshiba America Foundation believes science and mathematics are exciting fields in which all students can succeed with the proper tools and instruction.

Eligibility: Pre K – 12 educators Toshiba America Foundation grants support public and nonprofit private schools throughout the United States.

Amount of Awards: \$5,000

Deadline: The application deadline for grade K-5 applications (up to \$1,000) is October 1, annually. Application deadlines for grades 6-12 for grants of up to \$5,000 are March 1, June 1, September 1, and December 1, annually. The deadlines for grade 6-12 grant requests of more than \$5,000 are May 1 and November 1, annually.

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Organization: Saxena Family Foundation

Description: The Saxena Family Foundation has a particular focus on initiatives that promote US science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education and the empowerment of girls, female children, and young women so that they have equal rights later in life. Previous grantees have included schools, universities, and nonprofit organizations. Eligibility: Public, Charter, Other (including homeschool, 501 (c)(3) organizations)

Amount of Awards: Most awards range from \$5,000 to \$50,000

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Organization: FCEA Educational Foundation and AFCEA Chapters

Description: The AFCEA Educational Foundation, in partnership with AFCEA chapters, awards Gravelly Grants for elementary-level teachers and Paige Grants for middle school teachers to promote innovative science, technology,

engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education within classrooms and outside, such as through robotics clubs. Teachers working with students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds receive priority. Grant requests are evaluated on teacher skill level, potential for funds to be used well, and school financial need.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are elementary and middle school STEM teachers in US public and private schools

Amount of Award: \$2,000

Deadline: Applications are accepted year round

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Organization: The Alfred E. Friend, Jr., W4CF, Educational Activities Fund of the American Radio Relay League Foundation

Description: The Alfred E. Friend, Jr., W4CF, Educational Activities Fund provides annual grants for educational programs and activities of amateur radio organizations, with special emphasis on projects involving youth and teacher development. Eligible projects include explorations and ongoing education related to wireless; science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM); and radio technology. The fund is administered by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL) Foundation.

Organizations with a focus on educating, licensing, and supporting amateur radio activities are eligible to apply. Youth-based projects and initiatives are encouraged. Applications must be submitted online.

Eligibility: Public, Private, Charter, Other (including homeschool, 501 (c)(3) organizations); 3-5, 6-8, 9-12, Higher Ed, Adult

Amount of Award: \$3,000

Deadline: Applications are accepted year-round
